Candidates will be required to demonstrate knowledge and understanding using specialist language and terminology when responding to the question, and in meeting the AO2 descriptors described below.</p> <p>Candidates may refer to the following in relation to AO1</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The Ramayana is a smriti text. • This epic poem narrates the struggle of the divine prince Rama to rescue his wife Sita from the demon king Ravana. • The Ramayana includes details of Rama and of his exploits as an avatar of Vishnu. <p>AO2 requires candidates to develop their answers showing analytical and evaluative skills to address the question. Such responses will be underpinned by their use of knowledge and understanding.</p> <p>Candidates may refer to the following in relation to AO2.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The relationship between Rama and Sita as indicated in the Ramayana is significant because of their continuing influence upon Hindu marriage traditions. • The poem is important because it illustrates the value of upholding dharma, even under difficult circumstances. • The Ramayana illustrates various virtues of female and male avatars because the poem illustrates the ideal woman and ideal king. • The significance of the scripture is seen in its various adaptations across a range of religious traditions and cultures because it highlights the importance of the righteous path for all peoples. <p>Candidates who show achievement only against AO1 will not be able to gain marks beyond the top of Level 1.</p>	(9)

3	<p>3 marks AO1, 6 marks AO2</p> <p>AO1 will be used by candidates to underpin their analysis and evaluation. Candidates will be required to demonstrate knowledge and understanding using specialist language and terminology when responding to the question, and in meeting AO2 descriptors described below.</p> <p>Candidates may refer to the following in relation to AO1.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> There is an emphasis on fulfilling one’s duty within dharma. Sanatana Dharma emphasises duties within Hindu society. Dharma is linked to various duties in the ashramas. <p>AO2 requires candidates to develop their answers showing analytical and evaluative skills to address the question. Such responses will be underpinned by their use of knowledge and understanding.</p> <p>Candidates may refer to the following in relation to AO2.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> It is important to interpret the principles of dharma within its complex range of beliefs because this shows the link between Hindu theology and implications for practical morality. Rta is an underlying fundamental belief within Hindu thought because it underpins theology and dharma with its stress on correct ritual and the impact of karma. Dharma is epitomised in the Laws of Manu because these provide divine sanction and are binding on moral and legal matters. The implications of the principles of dharma are contentious because of the different interpretations of dharma across diverse Hindu traditions such as Samkhya with its rejection of God and emphasis on dharma as a way of life. <p>Candidates who show achievement only against AO1 will not be able to gain marks beyond the top of Level 1.</p>

4(b)	<p>5 marks AO1, 15 marks AO2</p> <p>AO1 will be used by candidates to underpin their analysis and evaluation. Candidates will be required to demonstrate knowledge and understanding using specialist language and terminology when responding to the question, and in meeting AO2 descriptors described below.</p> <p>Candidates may refer to the following in relation to AO1.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Samsara explains that the self is in a state of change. • Samsara may be seen in the context of hope for liberation. • Samsara has implications for moral life styles and moksha. <p>AO2 requires candidates to develop their answers showing analytical and evaluative skills to address the question. Such responses will be underpinned by their use of knowledge and understanding.</p> <p>Candidates may refer to the following in relation to AO2.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Atman, as the unchanging soul, has important implications for human beings because it presents a rare opportunity (being born as human) to break the sequence of samsara and become released. • Atman never reincarnates, but the body and personality change and these beliefs are important because they display the impact of karma on good or ill. • Karma along with devotion and knowledge develops virtue for the Atman and this is significant because of release from reincarnation. • The significance of moksha is based on the aim of attaining the blissful state of freedom from samsara because this represents the overall aim of the self. • Alternative interpretations of moksha are significant because some Hindu traditions see moksha as attainable by one's own effort whilst others believe it results from the intervention of a deity. • The interrelationships between samsara and the atman are significant because they illustrate the interconnections within Sanatana Dharma for belief and practice. <p>Candidates who show achievement only against AO1 will not be able to gain marks beyond the top of Level 1.</p>
